Credit Hour Equivalency Chart

Middle States requires us to document that the credit hours and rigor of an Online or Hybrid course is equal to that of our face-to-face offerings.

The chart below details how much in-class time needs to be accounted for in online course work, depending on the length of the course and the credit hours of the course. This is based on the College's definition of credit hours, calculated using the Carnegie Unit system.

Note that this "in-class" time needs to be accounted for through work that is the type that would be done in a physical classroom during a meeting time. Reading assignments, reasearch papers, or other projects that would normally be assigned as homework and done outside of the classroom in a face-to-face course are not counted as "in-class" time.

Length of Course	Credit Hours	In-Class Time
15 weeks	3	2 hours 30 minutes per week
15 weeks	4	3 hours 20 minutes per week
7 weeks	3	5 hours 20 minutes per week
7 weeks	4	7 hours 10 minutes per week
5 weeks	3	7 hours 30 minutes per week
5 weeks	4	10 hours per week

Note: adjustments should be made by the instructor for any courses that fall outside the listed criteria
