Enrollment:

Enrollment figures for Summer II show that compared to last year, Summer II enrollments increased - 28.78%, with 1,481 students enrolled (331 additional students), and 1,614 credit hours – an increase of 36.38%. Final Summer II enrollment figures will be captured on Friday, August 6th. Fall enrollment is currently at 79.43% of our headcount enrollment goal and 83.05% of our credit hour goal with 3,278 full-time and 1,980 part-time students registered for a total of 57,624 credit hours.

The daylong festivities will begin at 10 a.m. in the Physical Education Center with greetings and featured speakers. 
















