Trustee Yolette Ross read the Open Public Meetings Act Statement then led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance. This was followed with roll call by Trustee Jean DuBois.

Chair Concordia welcomed everyone and acknowledged Ms. Jessica Jolly, Faculty Representative, Mr. Dylan Hughes, Student Government Association President, and Mr. Lyman Barnes, Freeholder Education Liaison. After Mr. Concordia's greetings, he asked to move forward with the recognition portion of the agenda.

#### RECOGNITION

President Keating introduced Eileen Shute, Executive Director, College Relations, Communications and Marketing. Ms. Shute introduced Andrea Zane, *South Jersey Biz* Sales Director. Ms. Zane presented the "Best of Biz 2014" award to the Trustees and explained that Rowan College at Gloucester County had been selected by the readers of the *South Jersey Biz* magazine for this honor.

President Keating introduced Brian Rowan, Assistant Athletic Director and Head Men's Tennis Coach. Mr. Rowan presented the Collegiate Athletic Administrators of New Jersey

(CAANJ) Cup for Overall Athletic Program Excellence for 2013-2014. He stated that this is the ninth consecutive year that the College has been recognized with this award, and the thirteenth time overall. He then introduced new Women's Tennis Coach Kelly Hernandez and announced that the team successfully wrapped up the regional championship last night and now advance to the national championship tournament.

Ms. Danielle Morganti, Executive Director, Human Resources, introduced new employees Jaclyn Abrams, Coryndi McFadden, Chibueze Okechukwu, Mary Anne Seville, Shannon White, Mark Zorzi, and Donna Hamlet. She mentioned that Employee of the Month Jeanne LaBuz was unable to be present this evening.

President Keating congratulated Brigette Satchell, Dean of Continuing Education, and Joyce Feder, ACT program, for being recognized as "2014 Gloucester County Women of Achievement". He also congratulated Jaclyn Abrams, ACT Transition Specialist, for being named the recipient of "The ARC New Jersey Educator of the Year" award.

Dr. Susan Hall, Dean of Nursing and Allied Health, introduced Michael Keith, Instructor and Program Director of the Diagnostic Medical Sonography program. Mr. Keith introduced Laura Rohrman, DMS Clinical Coordinator, DMS graduates Patricia Colella and Sandra Rauh, and DMS students Sara Patterson and Stephanie Shultz. They described and demonstrated an ultrasound scan and exam of a carotid artery. The graduates stated that the reputation of the DMS program is a level above the rest and speaks for itself. Mr. Keith thanked the trustees for their continued support and Dean Hall announced that our students are now permitted to take their certification boards prior to graduation. This is a rare privilege approved as a result of the program's exemplary accreditation.

#### **ACCEPTANCE OF MINUTES**

Chair Concordia declared the September 9, 2014 Regular Session minutes approved as presented.

#### **REPORTS**

#### 1. President's Report

President Keating mentioned that the College is now in the recruiting cycle, and we are hosting an open house on October 16. He then referred the Trustees to new publications at their places (attached): an updated "At-a-Glance"; the "2014 Fast Facts" summary of most asked for statistics; and the "2014 Annual Institutional Profile" summary of data reported to the government.

a. Memorandum of Understanding: GCIT Collegiate High School Program

President Keating described the academic exchange of students as a shared services proposal for senior year high school students and how this aggressive dual enrollment

advantage agreement between Rowan College at Gloucester County and the Board of Education of the Special Services School District and the Vocational School District of the County of Gloucester will benefit Gloucester County high school students by increasing access to a college education with significant cost savings. Trustee Doug Wills offered his strong support. On the recommendation of the President, Ms. Ross made a motion, seconded by Mr. Wills and unanimously passed, to approve the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding with the Board of Education of the Special Services School District and the Vocational School District of the County of Gloucester and implementation of the "GCIT Collegiate High School Program". President Keating thanked the Board for their support in bringing a new vision of what education can be.

President Keating introduced Dominick Burzichelli, Vice President and Chief Operating Officer. Mr. Burzichelli gave an overview of the 2014/2015 capital projects and initiatives (attached), and Dr. Keating recognized him for his outstanding leadership keeping all the balls in the air with all of the on-going construction and upgrades. Mr. Burzichelli acknowledged Josh Piddington, Chief Information Officer, and his team for their outstanding work behind the scenes.

President Keating stated that we have everything we can in play and it is remarkable how we transitioned over to RCGC in a few weeks all while managing the capital projects. Trustee Wills added that the support of the Freeholders is appreciated and stated that without their support, these projects could not be done.

Chair Concordia agreed that the conversion from GCC to RCGC was remarkable. He recognized Eileen Shute, Executive Director, College Relations, Communications and Marketing, for her leadership and execution of the successful marketing campaign. He also recognized her and her team for all of the outstanding communications and public relations work done to "get the word out". Dr. Lavender echoed his kudos and added that the great marketing efforts "worked" and that the message is definitely out there.

#### 2. Student Government Association Report

Ms. Judith Atkinson, Vice President of Student Services, spoke to October being "Community Service Month" at RCGC and provided a handout of community service opportunities (attached). Mr. Dylan Hughes, SGA President, commented on the community service events on the handout being sponsored by the SGA.

#### 3. Finance

Trustee Douglas Wills asked Ms. Elizabeth Hall, Executive Director, Financial Services, to remark on the financial statements. She stated that the numbers are good and fairly firm for FY14. She also mentioned that the routine annual audits started this week.



#### **2014 Institutional Profile Report**

#### **Executive Summary**

The 2014 Institutional Profile Report reflects data submitted in mandated state and federal reports during the 2013-2014 academic year. Highlights include:

- Fall enrollment increased 3.5% between 2009 and 2013 enrolling 6,720 students. Full-time enrollment has increased 5.9% since 2009; accounting for 60.0% of the student body in Fall 2013 compared to 58.6% in Fall 2009. (Section II.B.1)
- Continuing Education non-credit open enrollment accounted for 7,400 registrations; 68.6% dedicated to career courses. 97.2% of registrations target the general adult population. Customized Training served 13 business clients in fiscal year 2013 with 10,049 registrations equaling a full-time equivalent of 82 students. (Section II.B.3)
- Annual credit enrollment for academic year 2013 totaled 10,953 students and 164,699 credit hours for a full-time equivalent of 5,490 students. (Section II.B.4)
- Remediation rates of incoming full-time freshman were 54.1%. The highest remediation enrollment area among freshman was writing (38.9%) followed by reading (32.9%), computation (19.5%) and algebra (7.9%). (Section II.C.2)
- Student demographic profile reflects a 30.1% minority student population, 74.6% under 25 years of age, 79.7% are Gloucester County residents and 99.7% are New Jersey residents. Males represent a higher proportion of full-time students (46.9%) compared to part-time students (36.2%). The traditional age student (under 25 years of age) represents a higher proportion of full-time students (86.6%) compared to part-time students (56.0%). (Section II.C.3)
- Financial Aid awards totaled \$18.3m in academic year 2012-13, 88.8% in federal aid programs, 10.8% in state aid programs and 0.4% in institutional aid programs. (Section II.C.4)
- Student success rate in terms of combined 3-year graduation and transfer-out rate was 42.2% with 22.0% graduating and 20.2% transferring out within three years of enrolling at RCGC. Success rates were highest for students classified in IPEDS race/ethnicity category 'Asian' (55.5%) followed by 'White' (43.6%), 'Hispanic' (38.5%) and 'Black' (36.5%). (Table II.D.1)
- Fall-to-Fall retention rate in 2013 was 58.9% for first-time students; the retention rate of full-time students was 63.7% compared to the part-time student retention rate of 42.2%. (Section II.D.2)
- Full-time faculty represent 21.3% of the total faculty; of those, 70.4% are tenured. The ratio of full-time to adjunct faculty is 1:4.7; 39.5% of course sections are taught by full-time faculty. (Section II.E)
- RCGC faculty and staff were involved in numerous research, scholarly and community service activities throughout the year. (Section II.H; Section III.A)
