Trustee Yolette Ross read the Open Public Meetings Act Statement then led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance. This was followed with roll call by Trustee Jean DuBois.

Chair Concordia welcomed everyone and acknowledged Ms. Jessica Jolly, Faculty Representative, Mr. Dylan Hughes, Student Government Association President, Mr. Lyman Barnes, Freeholder Education Liaison, and recently appointed Trustee Ms. Peggy Nicolosi. After Mr. Concordia's greetings, he asked to move forward with the recognition portion of the agenda.

RECOGNITION

President Keating explained that the location of Board of Trustee meetings has temporarily been moved to the annex while the library board room is being used for offices during campus construction. He then introduced Ron Case, Dean of Health, Physical Education and Recreation and Athletic Director.

Dean Case spoke of the many championships and other accomplishments of the athletes and the athletic programs during the past year. He then introduced Brian Rowan, Assistant

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Athletic Director and Head Men's Tennis Coach. Mr. Rowan introduced student athletes from the men's tennis team and shared their academic and athletic accomplishments with the audience. Head Cross Country Coach and Track & Field Coach Ryan Hughes was then introduced. Mr. Hughes introduced student athletes from the Men's Track & Field team and the Women's Track & Field team and shared their academic and athletic accomplishments with the audience.

ACCEPTANCE OF MINUTES

Chair Concordia declared the July 29, 2014 Regular Session minutes and the August 20, 2014 Special Session minutes approved as presented.

REPORTS

1. President's Report

President Keating began with congratulations and credit to all for a successful college opening, which began with All College Day on September 2. It was a great day and a great program, and over 1,500 new students participated in this day of orientation.

He announced that the college has been getting positive press, including:

- South Jersey Biz magazine recognized Rowan College at Gloucester County as the "Best in Biz Education";
- Community College Week ranked our Exercise Science program at 15 nationally and our Education program at 39 nationally in the annual "Top 100 Associate Degree and Certificate Producer" edition:
- The South Jersey Times ran an article on Business Studies Dean Patricia Claghorn's appointment to Executive Vice Chairperson of the American Red Cross South Jersey Chapter. She will be able to help the nonprofit hire RCGC interns;
- STEM Dean Dr. Brenden Rickards was acknowledged and recognized for recent articulation agreements and for the coverage they received.

Dr. Keating mentioned that all seven labor agreements have been settled. He stated that there will be labor peace for the next three years and that he is proud of the spirit of cooperation by all.

Dr. Keating introduced the President's Report worksheet (attached) and gave updates on items on the list. He remarked that enrollment to date is remarkable, and September 16 is census day. Also, the College is operating in a healthy environment and is fiscally sound.

2. Student Government Association Report

Ms. Judith Atkinson, Vice President of Student Services, stated that it was a fabulous opening with All College Day and there is a great buzz on campus. Mr. Dylan Hughes,

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SGA President, thanked all for a great opening. He said that he has heard a lot of opinions and has been getting a lot of interest from students regarding the Student Government Association.

3. Finance

Trustee Doug Wills asked Ms. Elizabeth Hall, Executive Director, Financial Services, to remark on the financial statements. She confirmed that the college is financially sound.

Mr. Burzichelli gave an update on new construction and renovation projects. He recognized the Office of Technology for all of their work to ensure a smooth VOIP cutover and for their efforts keeping the computers, etc., working through power failures and other obstacles.

- a. <u>Bid Waiver: Supply and Delivery of #2 Heating Oil:</u> *J. Swanton Fuel*On the recommendation of the President, Ms. DuBois made a motion, seconded by Ms. Ross and unanimously passed, to award a contract under the Uniform Shared Services and Consolidation Act, with the County of Gloucester as lead county cooperative purchasing agent, with J. Swanton Fuel of Atlantic Heights, New Jersey.
- b. <u>Purchasing Cooperative</u>: *Hunterdon County Educational Services*On the recommendation of the President, Ms. DuBois made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Scott and unanimously passed, to enter into a cooperative pricing agreement pursuant to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:11-11(5) with Hunterdon County Educational Services for the provision and performance of goods and services.
- c. <u>Bid Rejection</u>: Storm Sewer Pipe Repair
 On the recommendation of the President, Ms. DuBois made a motion, seconded by
 Mr. Daws and unanimously passed, to reject all bids publicly solicited on July 22,
 2014 for 308 feet of concrete storm sewer pipe repair. The bids were all over budget.

Approval to Apply and Upon Award, Approval to Accept and Sign: New Jersey Historical Commission for the Gloucester County Cultural & Heritage Commission On the recommendation of the President, Dr. Lavender made a motion, seconded by Ms. DuBois and unanimously passed, to approve a resolution to apply and, upon award, approval to accept and sign for funding from the New Jersey Historical Commission for the Gloucester County Cultural & Heritage Commission for the period of January 1, 2015 to June 30, 2015 in the amount of \$12,000.

RESOLUTION TO APPROVE A CONTRACT FOR THE SUPPLY AND DELIVERY OF #2 HEATING OIL

WHEREAS, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40-8A-1 *et seq.*, the New Jersey Uniform Shared Services and Consolidation Act, local governmental units are permitted to enter into agreements with other local governmental unit; and

WHEREAS, Rowan College at Gloucester County has a need to enter into a contract for the supply and delivery of #2 heating oil; and

WHEREAS, the Chief Financial Officer of the College has certified that funds are available for this purchase; and

WHEREAS, the County of Gloucester acts as lead agency in a county cooperative contract purchasing system. Under this system, the County solicits competitive bids for certain items to be purchased. Local contracting units within the County may purchase under the terms and conditions of selected contracts awarded by the County without the necessity of securing formal bids. This is a county cooperative contract purchasing system as defined and regulated by N.J.A.C. 5:34-7. The System Name is Gloucester County Cooperative Contract Purchasing System. The System Identifier is CK-01-GC. The Systems' establishment was approved by the Director of the Division of Local Government Services.

WHEREAS, Rowan College at Gloucester County was a part of the proposal for the cooperative purchasing of the supply and delivery of #2 heating oil,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of Rowan College at Gloucester County hereby authorizes and directs that the College shall enter into an agreement, under the Uniform Shared Services and Consolidation Act, with the County of Gloucester as lead county cooperative purchasing agent, with J. Swanton Fuel of Atlantic Heights, New Jersey.

RESOLUTION FOR MEMBER PARTICIPATION IN A COOPERATIVE PRICING SYSTEM

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40a:11-11(5) authorizes contracting units to establish a Cooperative Pricing System and to enter into Cooperative Pricing Agreements for its administration; and

WHEREAS, Hunterdon County Educational Services Commission, hereinafter referred to as the "Lead Agency" has offered voluntary participation in a Cooperative Pricing System for the purchase of goods and services;

WHEREAS, on September 9, 2014 the governing body of the Rowan College at Gloucester County, County of Gloucester, State of New Jersey duly considered participation in a Cooperative Pricing System for the provision and performance of goods and services;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

TITLE

This RESOLUTION shall be known and may be cited as the Cooperative Pricing Resolution of the Rowan College at Gloucester County.

AUTHORITY

Pursuant to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:11-11(5), the President of the College is hereby authorized to enter into a Cooperative Pricing Agreement with the Lead Agency.

CONTRACTING UNIT

The Lead Agency shall be responsible for complying with the provisions of the Local Public Contracts Law (N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 et seq.) and all other provisions of the revised statures of the State of New Jersey.

RESOLUTION TO APPROVE the Gloucester County Cultural & Heritage Commission under the auspices of Rowan College at Gloucester County apply and upon award, approval to accept and sign for a FY15 Project Grant in the amount of \$12,000 from the New Jersey Historic Commission for the grant period of January 1 thru June 30, 2015.

WHEREAS, this funding request will partially support the development of an immersive, site specific theatrical performance and educational workshops at the Whitall House at Red Bank Battlefield in National Park for audiences in April 2015;

WHEREAS, playwright, Joseph Salvatore, Professor of Educational Theater at New York University, has created scripts and will direct the performances consisting of monologues and scenes set in multiple locations on the battlefield; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey actors will perform the play, and teaching artists will engage audiences in workshops that explore how contemporary issues relate to the site's history utilizing theater techniques tailored to the specific community being served.
