Course: EN 225 Introduction to Latino Literature

Credits: 3

Prerequisites

Students taking English 225 shall have successfully passed English 102.

Description

English 225 is designed to introduce students to a particular and important genre. The course intends to have the student survey and gain an appreciation of Latino novels, plays, poetry, and short stories by reading works that are timeless and important.

Learning Outcomes

At the completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Survey and gain knowledge of Latino literature and art by reading and discussing works from all periods.
- Apply critical reading, thinking, and writing skills.
- Develop an essay or critical analysis around one central idea or thesis.
- Create a cohesive structure with which to present important critical ideas, and to learn to present those ideas logically and with originality. Upon completion of the course, students will have an appreciation for analysis and creative interpretation (literary criticism).

<u>Related General Education Outcomes</u>

Global & Cultural Awareness (Diversity)

- Students will link cultural practices and perspectives with geographic and/or historical conditions from which they arose.
- Students will recognize and assess the contributions and impact of people from various nations and/or cultures.

Topical Outline

English 225 is a course in the study of Latino literature. The main goal is to improve students' appreciation for this important genre. Students will present oral reports and at least three major essays which will be graded on content, structure, and style.

Topics include:

- Intro to the course: Overview of Latino literature
- Physical Features of Latin America: Mexico, Central America, South America
- Latino subcultures
- Latino literature genres: poetry, the novel, short story, drama
- The Cuban Revolution and subsequent diaspora: Guevara, Castro, JFK
- The Cuban novel

- The Puerto Rican experience: the homeland and the "Nuyrican."
- The Puerto Rican novel
- Puerto Ricans in American cities: straddling cultures
- Magical Realism: The sweeping South American novel
- Latino culture/history/value systems: Latino families and traditions.
- Immigration patterns and problems: Latino essays and short stories
- Poetry of Latin American women
- Growing up Latino: poems, stories, drama
- Latino film and literature
- Language barriers and urban/educational issues

Student Assessment

Students will be responsible for a minimum of three major out-of-class papers that utilize standard MLA research techniques. Each paper will be 5-9 pages and focus on three of the following genres: the novel, short story, poetry, drama, and the essay.
