Prerequisite: SO 201

This course offers a scientific study of crime and criminals; analysis of the nature and extent of crime in the U.S.; causes of crime and criminality; the development of the law and criminal justice system; characteristics and treatment of criminals; patterns of criminal behavior; the impact of crime on our society; an overview of early criminological theories; and contemporary sociological, psychological, and psychiatric approaches to explaining criminal behavior.

- 7. **Historical Perspective:** Students will understand historical events and movements in World, Western, non-Western or American societies and assess their subsequent significance.
- 8. **Global and Cultural Awareness:** Students will understand the importance of a global perspective and culturally diverse peoples.
- 9. Ethical Reasoning and Action: Students will understand ethical issues and situations.
- 10. **Information Literacy:** Students will address an information need by locating, evaluating, and effectively using information.
