This course is designed as a study of violence and crime in America through historical perspectives, theory, diverse acts of violence, the media and statistical trends. Specific violent crimes such as homicide, family violence, sexual assault, workplace violence, youth violence, and serial crimes will be surveyed. Acts of official violence, such as capital punishment and police brutality, will also be examined along with their impact on society.
