CRJ 250 Constitutional Issues in Criminal Justice

Syllabus

Lecture Hours/Credits: 3/3

Catalog Description

Prerequisite: Passing grade in RDG 099

This course is a review and analysis of important United States Supreme Court decisions involving contemporary practices of law enforcement agencies and the conduct of criminal court procedures. Particular emphasis will be placed on the Supreme Court decisions in the areas of probable cause, search and seizure, confessions, wire-tapping, police liability, and the admissibility of evidence at trial. Class discussion may also explore the manner in which New Jersey courts have ruled on the same issues.

- 9. Ethical Reasoning and Action: Students will understand ethical issues and situations.
- 10. **Information Literacy:** Students will address an information need by locating, evaluating, and effectively using information.
