This course is a study of contemporary police principles and practices with an emphasis on accepted administrative methods for achieving law enforcement objectives. Basic organization and administrative decisions are approached from the point of view of police chiefs, commanders, and administrators. Decisions concerning personnel, community relations, operations, and administration are studied.

- 7. **Historical Perspective:** Students will understand historical events and movements in World, Western, non-Western or American societies and assess their subsequent significance.
- 8. **Global and Cultural Awareness:** Students will understand the importance of a global perspective and culturally diverse peoples.
- 9. Ethical Reasoning and Action: Students will understand ethical issues and situations.
- 10. **Information Literacy:** Students will address an information need by locating, evaluating, and effectively using information.
