Tips for Parents

Parents are an essential component of students' success in college. Students need support and encouragement from home. Below are a few tips to help you give your student(s) support.

1. Communicate with your student regularly throughout the semester to offer support. Ask about your student's courses, which one is his/her favorite, grades earned, etc.
2. Encourage your student to accomplish small achievements, such as completing homework on time. Small achievements add up to success in the course.
3. Encourage your student to speak to his/her instructors and to visit the Academic Support Center early and often.



Frequently Asked Questions

What questions should I ask my son or daughter?

The most important thing is to express an interest in your student's learning and success and to be supportive and encouraging, especially when your student faces setbacks. You can ask questions such as What do you want to achieve this semester? Are you doing well on homework and exams? What classes are challenging? Which class is your favorite? Do you need any help? What can I do to help you?

When should I check-in on the child's progress?

Check in early and often. Begin on the first day with questions about the courses and instructors, especially during your student's freshman year. Continue communicating throughout the semester, especially in the weeks leading up to midterms and finals. You may want to keep a copy of the school's calendar and your student's course schedule.

When should I encourage my son or daughter to seek tutoring or other support services?

Encourage your student to visit Tutoring Services early in the semester. Tutoring isn't only for struggling students. In fact, many A students use our services regularly. Many visit once or twice a week.

Is there a charge for tutoring?

No, tutoring is free for the subjects for which your student is currently enrolled.

Who are the tutors?

Tutors consist of students who have excelled at their subject, graduates with Bachelor's, Master's and Doctoral degrees, and faculty members.
